The ANC team and the new Project Advisory Committee now have a clear direction for future planning as well as many excellent ideas for neighbourhood projects.



Residents spoke with pride about the many positive reasons for living in the Simpson-Ogden area and about their commitment to make the neighbourhood a better place by addressing issues of safety, housing and the need for improved social and recreation services.

"This is the first Saturday afternoon in seven years of living here that I have felt part of a neighbourhood," commented one of the residents.

Neighbourhoods and Urban Transformation: the New Global Context Urban Affairs Association, 36th Annual Meeting Montréal, Canada April 19 - 22, 2006

In 1950, approximately one-third of the world's population lived in cities. By the year 2000, the proportion had increased to one-half. Most importantly, it is projected that by 2050, that nearly two-thirds or 6 billion people will occupy urban places (UN-Habitat, 2005). And where do the majority of these humans live?

In neighbourhoods.

Neighbourhoods are, as Jane Jacobs has argued, the building blocks of urban life. But much has changed about urban neighbourhoods during the past fifty years. Research on neighbourhoods has changed as well.

Neighbourhoods and Urban Transformation: the New Global Context is the Urban Affairs Association’s 36th Annual Meeting. Themes of the conference include:

1. Neighbourhood Identity - grassroots leadership, social capital, community-based planning, gentrification;
2. Neighbourhood Environments and Economic Sustainability - measures of health and safety, environmental justice, poverty alleviation, employment and economic opportunity;

3. Neighbourhood Culture and Organization- gendered space, race/ethnicity/class, community organizations, capacity building;
4. Transnational Neighbourhoods - immigration and ethnic enclaves, social movements, population dynamics;
5. Neighbourhood Renewal - New Urbanism and urban Neighbourhoods, redeveloping downtowns, transit planning, alternative zoning, affordable housing; and
6. Governance, Public Policy and Neighbourhoods - municipal, regional and national government policy initiatives that affect Neighbourhoods; politics and Neighbourhoods.
